We provided unique neonatal designs on our sweat shirts and T-shirt merchandise that wear proudly, including many of our partners in providing neonatal care. We are proud of our past and present accomplishments and we look forward to continuing our service to support our mission. Thank you for our loyal vendors' support through the years as well.

Currently CCANN has 140 members as of April 2018. We are listed as the third largest NANN chapter in the United States. Our membership has experienced the negative economic impact, as well as competition with the other lower cost national neonatal nursing organization. 2018 Spring Conference and Breakfast Conference Recaps

For the Spring 2018 Conference, CCANN featured topics related to *Cutting Edge Trends in Neonatal Nutrition*. The conference opened with Dr. Mario Rojas, a Neonatologist and new medical director of Valley Children's Hospital. He described microbial evolution starting from more than 3 billion years ago, the development of microbiomes, the function of probiotics and how they prevent bacterial translocation and sepsis. Dr. Rojas' scientific presentation provided much insight into the importance of maintaining a robust microbiome for optimal health and he ended his presentation with the question for the audience: whether or not probiotics prevent NEC in neonates. Following his presentation were two other captivating speakers—Terry Johnson, a Neonatal Nurse Practitioner, and Dr. Julia Mizener, another Neonatologist at Valley Children's Hospital. Terry Johnson discussed the role of human milk oligosaccharides in establishing and maintaining the microbiome as well as immunologic advantages of human milk feeding in the NICU. The conference concluded with Dr. Mizener's discussion of the benefits of breast milk in preemie neurodevelopment. Some important considerations that may require follow up following this informative conference include the safety of cotton tipped applicators for oral care in the NICU, the role of skin-to-skin contact in neonatal resuscitation (in some countries, neonatal resuscitation including umbilical catheterization and intubation is done during skin-to-skin), and the significance of promoting a diverse microbiome in the neonate through the provision of human milk, probiotics, and effective antibiotic stewardship.

"Breakfast and Learn"

Most recently, CCANN also organized a mini-conference at Marie Callender's Restaurant featuring Dr. Radhika Narang, a neonatologist at Valley Children's Hospital. Dr. Narang presented on *Non-immune Hydrops Fetalis (NIHF) in a Neonate*. With a higher frequency of this diagnosis, this was an opportune time for Dr. Narang to explain NIHF and how "it represents a large spectrum of rare disorders and conditions." She distinguished NIHF with Immune Hydrops Fetalis, and proceeded to delve into the pathophysiology, multifarious causes, and management. During her presentation, Dr. Narang shared beautiful pictures of Alaska and had quiz questions to keep attendees engaged.



Both conferences yielded a great-turn out and CCANN members provided high evaluations—as such CCANN encourages all members and non-members to attend future conferences to enrich their practice.



Methadone and Breast Feeding

Illicit drug use and legal substance use/abuse is a significant problem among women of childbearing age. For pregnant and postpartum women, methadone maintenance has been the treatment of choice for opioid dependence in the United States, Canada, and many other countries. Since 2001, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) has endorsed that methadone is compatible with breastfeeding regardless of mother's dose. Concentrations of methadone in human milk and the effects on the infant have been well-studied. The levels of methadone found in human milk are low.

Breast milk is optimal for infant nourishment and has a positive effect on long term health for the mother-infant dyad. Specifically, breastfeeding promotes positive early infant attachment experiences and decreases maternal stress responses. Research shows breast feeding and breast milk was associated with reduced NAS severity in infants born to drug-dependent mothers. This is especially helpful to methadone-exposed infants and their mothers. Overall, methadone-maintained women have low rates of breastfeeding for a number of reasons. One barrier to breastfeeding in this group is the lack of clear, consistent messaging regarding methadone and breastfeeding from the healthcare team. For example, staff members feeding formula to an infant when stored breast milk is available. This will quickly discourage even a determined breast feeder and may confuse the infant.

The exposure of infants to methadone through their mothers' breast milk is minimal. Women on stable doses of methadone maintenance, regardless of dose, should be encouraged to breastfeed, if desired.
